# Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday ending on Divine Mercy Sunday

#### **Divine Mercy Novena**

Unlike other novenas, where people ask for something from God through the intercession of His Holy Saints, the Divine Mercy Novena is intended to be prayed for graces and/or salvation to be given to other people. Jesus asked Sr. Faustina that this novena be prayed prior to the Feast of Divine Mercy (the Sunday after Easter), beginning on Good Friday. He gave Sr. Faustina an intention to pray for on each day of the Novena, saving for the last day the most difficult intention of all, the lukewarm and indifferent of whom He said: "These souls cause Me more suffering than any others; it was from such souls that My soul felt the most revulsion in the Garden of Olives. It was on their account that I said: 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass Me by.' The last hope of salvation for them is to flee to My Mercy."

In her diary, Divine Mercy in My Soul, Sr. Faustina wrote that Jesus told her: "On each day of the novena you will bring to My heart a different group of souls and you will immerse them in this ocean of My mercy. . . On each day you will beg My Father, on the strength of My passion, for the graces for these souls." Join us in praying the Divine Mercy Novena from home as we await the Celebration of God's Great Mercy on Divine Mercy Sunday.

## <u>Divine Mercy Sunday: Was only in 2000 that this feast</u> was created by Pope John Paul II

Jesus told St Faustina (Diary 699): "on that day (Divine Mercy Sunday)...the soul that will go to confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment". Here are recommendations:

- Go to Confession, and if you can't, do an Act of Contrition, just telling God you're sorry.
- Go to Holy Communion. If you can't, make a Spiritual Communion just telling God that "I am uniting with you."
- "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a poor sinner."



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today we join with the universal Church in commending the soul of Pope Francis to the infinite mercy of God. His pontificate has been one marked by mercy and evangelization. His apostolic exhortation touched me so deeply that I adopted its title, Evangelii Gaudium - the Joy of the Gospel, as my episcopal motto.

For Pope Francis, a renewed encounter with Jesus was primary. His legacy will be one of seeking out the lost, sending us to the peripheries and finding Jesus in the poor, the marginalized and the forgotten. My most memorable encounter with the Holy Father was during my Ad Limina visit to Rome in 2017, where he asked the bishops to prioritize two things - prayer and sharing the Gospel. As we reflect on his life and ministry to the Church as a successor of Peter, what better way to honor his legacy than to embrace our baptismal call as missionary disciples sharing the hope that does not disappoint (c.f. Romans 5:5).

I would like to invite you to Holy Hour Vigil at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on Friday April 25, 2025 at 7:00 pm, as faithful throughout the world anticipate the funeral Mass for Pope Francis on Saturday April 26, 2025 in Rome. On Tuesday, April 29, at 7:00 pm there will be a Memorial Mass for Pope Francis at the Cathedral that I will preside. I encourage you to participate in any other prayers and devotions that are being offered in your parish.

With deep confidence that the Lord turns all sorrow into joy, we give thanks for the gift of Pope Francis to the Church and pray that he will be hastily received into the arms of the Father whom he loved so dearly in life. May the words of his final Urbi et Orbi message bring us comfort: "In the Lord's Paschal Mystery, death and life contended in a stupendous struggle, but the Lord now lives forever. He fills us with the certainty that we too are called to share in the life that knows no end, when the clash of arms and the rumble of death will be heard no more. Let us entrust ourselves to him, for he alone can make all things new (cf. Rev. 21:5)!" (April 20, 2025).

# Statement to the Catholic Faithful by the Permanent Council of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops on the 2025 Federal Election

In this <u>Jubilee Year of Hope 2025</u>, as we prepare for a federal election in Canada, it is essential that, as citizens and Catholics, we reflect on the challenges currently facing our nation with a spirit of hope and a vision for a better future.

In a free and democratic society, all those eligible to vote have not only a <u>right, but also a responsibility to engage with local candidates and political parties</u>. We are called to discern which policies best serve the common good—that which the Church defines as "<u>the sum of those conditions of ... social life whereby people, families and associations more adequately and readily may attain their own perfection</u>" (*Gaudium et Spes*, n. 74.1). As faithful citizens, we are invited to help shape our earthly society in accordance with God's divine plan, always mindful that "our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil 3:20).

Our Catholic faith provides essential moral and social guidance, helping us understand and respond to the critical issues facing our country. The role of pastors—especially the Pope and bishops—is to articulate the principles of faith and Church teaching so that the lay faithful may form their consciences accordingly. As the Church teaches, it is the duty of the faithful "to see that the divine law is inscribed in the life of the earthly city" (Gaudium et Spes, n. 43.2).

There are many issues which we, as Catholics, are called to consider thoroughly when voting. Among them is the fundamental right to life—from conception to natural death. This right is being undermined by the <a href="lack of legal protection for the unborn">lack of legal protection for the unborn</a>, the <a href="ongoing expansion of eligibility for Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD)</a>, and the <a href="insufficient access to quality palliative care">insufficient access to quality palliative care</a> for those who are suffering at the end of life.

We must also advocate for the most vulnerable in our society: those living in <a href="poverty">poverty</a>, victims of <a href="https://human\_trafficking">human\_trafficking</a>, individuals suffering from <a href="mental\_illness">mental\_illness</a> and <a href="addiction">addiction</a>, the <a href="homeless">homeless</a>, and <a href="immigrants">immigrants</a>—each deserving of both social and legal support. Furthermore, there is increasing concern over growing <a href="immigrante-toward religious communities">in Canada</a>, including <a href="mental-threats-to-toward-teligious communities">threats to remove charitable tax status</a> simply for upholding values rooted in faith that diverge from prevailing secular ideologies.

This election is a profound opportunity for Catholics to contribute to building a civilization of love. We are called to walk together in justice and truth with <a href="Indigenous Peoples">Indigenous Peoples</a>. We are asked to examine policies that affect access to education, healthcare, housing, and social services for all, and to support initiatives that honour the <a href="family as the fundamental unit of society">family as the fundamental unit of society</a> and uphold the dignity of every human person, <a href="family as the fundamental unit of society">family as the fundamental unit of society</a> and uphold the

In a time of significant economic uncertainty, Canada needs a national economic vision that promotes the common good while respecting international obligations and fostering global solidarity. Economic development must be rooted in justice, <u>stewardship of creation</u>, and care for the vulnerable—both at home and abroad.

After careful reflection on these matters in the light of faith, we are called to form our consciences prayerfully and to express our convictions through our vote. Let us pray for our country, for all political candidates, and for our fellow citizens. Before casting our ballots, let us pause in personal prayer—perhaps by reciting the Lord's Prayer—and ask God's blessing upon those who will be elected to lead our nation.
